Dear Sir,

Mr. A. T. Chamberlain is a student of exceptional character and ability. He has unusual originality and strength. In the group with which he came in the College it required exceptional courage to identify oneself with the Student Christian Movement, but, although Mr. Chamberlain is poles apart from obscurantism, he has identified himself with the S.C.M. His work is entirely satisfactory and sound. As Hon. Secretary of the Students' Union he initiated conferences between the staff and student representatives.

His weaknesses known to me are as follows. He has lacked an environment of culture in its more superficial aspects and, as often happens, his strength of character has been something of an obstacle to acquiring culture in its more superficial aspects. Nevertheless he is quite a good critic of himself and has made and is making progress in the respect just named.

Another weak point known to me is that, feeling passionately, he is induced on occasion to act in a way that he himself cannot justify except that, feeling as he did at the time, he could not act otherwise. Such actions have not amounted to anything serious.

He has a keen sense of humour and is a very good fellow. His heart is absolutely in the right place and he is reasonable and wise, except for the above limitation, which, I have no doubt, he will overcome completely as he has already done in part.

He has taken his full share in games, dramatics etc.

I need hardly point out that Mr. Chamberlain's defects are rather defects of excess and often mark a man who later is an exceptional success in the best sense because of strength of character, drawing power etc.
