Dear Sir,

I am very sorry that it became necessary to ask your son to leave St. Anselm's Hall, but he himself saw that there was really no alternative. He had been taking one of the parlour maids out in the evenings and, as he frankly admitted that he knew, it is very strictly forbidden to students to have any dealings with the domestic staff, except those of an absolutely official nature. For the general well being of the Hall a breach of discipline of this kind must be severely dealt with; your son acknowledged this, and expressed his deep regret for what he had done.

I do not think, however, that you need be anxious concerning his welfare. It was thoughtlessness and folly on his part, but that was all. I have no doubt at all of his determination to be straight and honourable, and he has obtained lodgings with a student who is thought highly of by University authorities.

So, though from the point of view of the Hall, it is a serious matter, I am sure you need have no cause for anxiety concerning him.
