in a Scottish School, it is our end of term
and I couldn't manage to get there in
time, and even more to the point, I couldn't
hope to get back in time for Monday morning
they're very strict on punctuality in
Scotland!

I'm glad to hear that 'Dicky' Richardson
is to be the guest. The last time I heard
his name was in approx. 1942 when
I met 'Edge' Fitch on a Radar course
in the Army.

As you may notice my new address is at the head of the paper. I've been in this part of Scotland now for approx five years. I'm told I need to live here another thirty five years before they'll even consider me a visitor, and I'm told I'll never qualify to be a 'native'.

The teaching profession in Scotland is on the whole, better paid than in England, but to offset this, there are fewer chances of promotion. Maths + Science - which I teach incidentally - is as badly stuffed as in England, and from all accounts is not likely to improve.
