Dear Warden,

I shall do what I can to help by answering your enquiries in the order as set out in your letter:—

- (a) His work at this school from 1922—1926 was always of a good standard, and he left us after taking a good Matriculation certificate. His strongest subjects were literary; but he desired more Science work with a view to following an Engineering career. He then went wisely to Darlington Grammar School to get advanced work in Science, but they found there that he needed more Matriculation work in Science subjects, and he spent another year there working at a "Science Matriculation" which he gained in ^{July} 1927. I believe that he left Darlington Grammar School in December, 1927. Thus, he has had no Higher School Certificate or Advanced work in Science in the VIth Form of a school. This will be a handicap to him in pursuing an Honours Course in Science at a University, though in his case, it may be lessened by the keen interest which he takes in matters scientific.

- (b) He has no athletic abilities and no social qualities. He is likely to settle down happily in a common life, but he is not likely to give much to the general well-being of a Collegiate Institution.
- (c) His moral character is sound.
